Chair's Report:

Results of the Survey

A survey was sent to parents and guardians in January regarding parent council meetings. The survey results are as follows:

- 1. Would you prefer to meet using Microsoft teams or in person? 65.9% said in person
- 2. Is the 6pm-7pm time frame convenient for you? 77.50% said yes
- 3. Are you in need of child care in order to attend meetings? 41.9% said yes. Miss Cowan was providing child care for our meeting tonight; however, there weren't any children at tonight's meeting.
- 4. Are there other reasons that prevent you from attending? No reason 36.4%, Work 30.3%, Child Care 18.2%, and Other 15.2%

Fundraising

We are responsible to pick up the Krispy Kreme donuts from Mississauga so we will need volunteers to drive to Mississauga. Purchases for Krispy Kreme can be done on cash online. Tess will look into doing a Krispy Kreme fundraiser and will report back to the school council. Next year we will start fundraising earlier.

<u>Volunteers</u>

We are seriously close to losing our bingo slot. Since 2003 we have received \$50,622.41 from bingo. We use these proceeds to pay for taxis to drive our sports teams to their games at other schools as well as sport referees. We are extremely desperate for volunteers. We need volunteers the last Saturday of every month from 4pm – 6pm. We need 2 volunteers to attend during each of our time slots. This is a dire situation! In order to be a volunteer you need to complete a straight forward, 45 minute online training video. You are able to sit down during bingo and don't have to stand and walk around the whole time. If you become a bingo volunteer, you will receive a Princess Margaret shirt that you must wear while you volunteer at bingo. If you would like to be a bingo volunteer, please call the school.

Principal's Report:

Equity and Inclusion Presentation

Darren is going to see if he can provide us with online technology for our school council meeting that gives a 360 degree view of the classroom.

Niagara Falls has 500 newcomers that are attending 5 different schools. There is an impact on teachers to serve all students and there is also a big impact on the children. We are diverse in Niagara as there are more global citizens. It is important to show understanding. Darren is from the Toronto area and has worked in education for 28 years. The full understanding of equity and inclusion is based on human rights and finding ways to make everyone feel supported and included. Sharing support in schools and how to celebrate the narrative and story is very important. Eg. Is it celebrated in books and by teachers? We have to re-envision Halloween and Christmas. Our newcomers had horrific journeys, but that is not their narrative. Equity is very personal and DSBN is committed to making a better world for all children.
